Hue Jackson Foundation Survivors of Human Trafficking Residence July 17, 2018



Two of life's most basic needs are shelter and safety. Victims of human trafficking often find themselves lacking both.

Thanks to our community partner, The Salvation Army of Cleveland, we were able to open the special temporary residence. The 12-bed residence provides much needed services such as counseling and drug detox as well as a host of other services which are facilitated in part by many area agencies.




This is just the beginning and much more is needed. The projected annual operating costs is \$500,000 to run this facility 24 hours a day, 7 days a week. But the value of survivorship is priceless.

Launch early 2019



Hope Just Found is a web based software application that is being developed to connect nonprofit community organizations to volunteers and donors to fulfill specific needs. This is designed to allow organizations to publish their needs which are consistent with fulfilling their respective missions to seek support from those who can fulfill those needs, whether they be donated time, talent or resources. This is scheduled to launch in late January of 2019 in the NE Ohio area and then national by June of 2019.

In 2018, the Hue Jackson Foundation became one of two civilian representatives on the Northeast Ohio Amber Alert Committee (NOAAC). This committee represents 9 counties in NE Ohio and is the only one of its kind nationwide.

The committee meets monthly to review current cases with respective police departments to review best practices, implementations and success rates as well as ways to improve services for victims and their families. The committee also maintains consistent vigilance through the National Center for Missing and Exploited Children (NCMEC) of those who have been reported. We review all national reports in hopes of assisting in the recovery of someone's missing loved one.

One such notable improvement is the first ever Amber Alert Family Response Plan. This critical component is lead by Gina DeJesus, once a missing for 10 years, who has intimate knowledge of the critical needs of families during a crisis such as those of missing and endangered children.

In April of 2004, Gina DeJesus and her family's world was forever changed. At just 14 years old, she and her fellow prisoners, Amanda Berry and Michelle Knight, entered into a world that no one should ever experience. This nightmare lasted for 9 years for Gina. That isn't where the story ends, but it is where HOPE began.

Through her years of captivity, nothing could kill the hope and indomitable spirit of Gina. Now, alongside her family that never gave up belief that Gina would one day be home, they are offering HOPE to other families who are experiencing unimaginable fear and grief.

Just a short walk away and well within site of her place of captivity, Gina, with the help and support of her family, have opened the Cleveland Center for Missing, Abducted and Exploited Children and Adults and we are honored to be a part of their Board, their mentor and most importantly, their friend. This facility is open to all family members and friends who need support, guidance and advice as they navigate along their way on a journey of HOPE.



After just a few months of being open, we are proud to report that The Salvation Army has provided services for numerous survivors who are on their way towards personal independence, happiness and a brighter future.

A letter sent on Dec. 20, 2018

Hello, Mr. And Mrs. Jackson.

I personally wanted to thank you for opening up the shelter at the Salvation Army, and the services that is provided there. I am survivor of human trafficking, ran from Oklahoma City, ok. When I got to Cleveland, Ohio. I didn't want to stay, fear of being found. The men that hurt me, always told me no matter where I go, they will find me, and I believe they would. Salvation Army had provided the resources for therapy with Cleveland rape crisis center, psychiatrist at Frontline, that has helped me with a low dosage of medication and help me work through my fears. It wasn't easy but I made it through. I meet with Renee Jones Everything Center where I have built and building support there, a place I'll stay in contact with when I leave the Salvation Army. I got my housing with Eden. I will be moving next month. I'm scared and excited at the same time. It wasn't easy, it's been hard to get my life back together. Being at the Salvation Army had gave me time, space, encouragement, resources to help me rebuild my life back. Oh yes, I learned to color like an artist, make friendship bracelets, keychains, and bead with the art and craft supplies provided at the Salvation Army. Thank you for your Foundation !!!

- As a Private Foundation during 2018 Hue Jackson personally supported over 95% of the operations of the Foundation.
- In 2018 over 25% of the total distributed funds were given directly to other nonprofit organizations.
- In the 3rd quarter of 2018, the Hue Jackson Foundation began the process of changing from a “Private” foundation to a “Public Charity” thereby changing the status of tax deductible contribution status to benefit our donors and supporters.
